

GENERAL MEETING SUMMARY

The meeting was held at the College of Medicine in Room 1119BC on June 13, 1994. President Tim Martin called the meeting to order at 12:10 p.m. Tim announced that Dr. Stuart Houston of W.L. Gore & Associates had recently passed away. A suggestion had been made that the branch donate money to the Arizona Heart Center in his name. It was suggested that \$100.00 be donated, a vote was taken and unanimously approved. Grace Aranda will be asked to prepare the donation.

Tim went over the results of his survey, only 27 out of 1000 were returned. There is overwhelming need and support by the branch to offer hands-on training sessions. Karen Blohm, Jane Criswell and Cheryl Johnson will serve as investigators on a training protocol submitted to the UA IACUC. The Education Committee has been working on the first lab, which will hopefully be offered during the last week of July.

Education through meeting attendance along with active membership in the branch are viewed important for continued growth in the field of laboratory animal science. Exceptional accomplishments may include measures to encourage animal welfare in research, active participation in the local and national organizations for continued education, any paper presentation, articles or awards received to recognize exceptional contributions to the field of laboratory animal science along with active participation in community education and support.

Technician of the Year

Nominee demonstrates a positive attitude and a dedicated approach to the betterment of animal care through technical performance and education at their facility. Individual accomplishments may include participation in the AALAS certification process, assistance in facility training for fellow technicians, and the addition of personal certificates/diplomas earned in animal care related education. Any facility project initiated by a nominee to alleviate animal distress, enhance facility management, decrease animal numbers, or encourage skills in animal nursing should be recognized. Exceptional accomplishments may include measures to encourage animal welfare in research, active participation in the local and national organizations for continued education, any paper presentation, articles or awards received to recognize exceptional contributions to the field of laboratory animal science along with active participation in community education and support. Must hold supervisor position or below.

WHAT'S NEW IN THE NEWS

The Arizona Branch recently suffered the loss of one of its dedicated members. Stuart Houston, DVM, 52, of Flagstaff, died May 26, 1994. He was born in Flagstaff and attended Northern Arizona University and Colorado State University, Fort Collins. He served as Arizona AALAS Regional Examining Board for Northern Arizona repeatedly and will be deeply missed. Dr. Houston received a heart transplant in 1990 at University Medical Center in Tucson. He later worked as a spokesman for the Tucson hospital and counseled transplant patients. Survivors include his wife, Sheryl; daughter, Michelle; son, Christopher; stepdaughter, Cara; father, H. CERTIFICATION EXAMS - Answers to Questions about the Certification Program

How do I get a certification application or information about the AALAS Animal Technician Certification Program?

Contact the AALAS office, 70 Timber Creek Drive, Cordova, TN 38018; (901) 754-8620. The office will send you an application request card to send to the Professional Examination Service to request a candidate information package. Please do not contact the Professional Examination Service directly as this will only delay your request.

How do I apply for an examination?

Carefully read the applicant information package. If you meet the criterion complete the application and return it in the self-addressed envelope to the Professional Examination Service for processing. If your application is complete and you meet the criterion for examination, you will be sent a post card notifying you that you are eligible to take the exam. If your application is returned because you do not meet the requirements or because the application is not complete, you will be required to send an additional \$25.00 fee when you resubmit your application.

When are examinations offered?

The examinations will be administered via computers at over 250 testing sites around the country. When you receive your post card advising you that you are eligible to take the examination, you will call the testing site and schedule

the examination. Exams may be scheduled at the applicants convenience, Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

How and when will I receive the results of my exam?

Because the examination questions have been rewritten, they must be re-validated before results can be released. One hundred examinations are required at a given level to validate the questions at this level. After the initial 100 examination have been administered at a level, examinees will receive their results immediately at the testing center when they complete the examination. If you pass, a letter of acknowledgement and an individually numbered certificate will be forwarded to you at a later date.

What are the requirements for AALAS certification? The requirements are as follows:

Assistant Laboratory Animal Technician (ALAT)

- Graduate of a two-year degree program, (AA, AAS, or AS) in Veterinary Technology from an AVMA accredited program; or
- Graduate of a four-year BA/BS program in Veterinary Technology from an AVMA accredited program; or
- Licensed DVM
- High school diploma or GED and upon completion or one year of animal care experience in an approved facility, defined as a facility with either a USDA registration, AAALAC accreditation or PHS assurance number

Laboratory Animal Technician (LAT)

- ALAT certification and one year of additional experience in an approved facility, defined as a facility with either a USDA registration, AAALAC accreditation or PHS assurance number; or
- Graduate of a two-year program (AA,AAS,AS) in Veterinary Technology from an accredited program and two-years of additional animal care related experience in an approved facility, defined as a facility with either a USDA registration, AAALAC accreditation or PHS assurance number; or
- Graduate of a four-year BA/BS program in Veterinary Technology from an AVMA accredited program; or
- Licensed DVM; or
- High school diploma or GED and upon completion of three years of animal care experience in an approved facility, defined as a facility with either a USDA registration, AAALAC accreditation or PHS assurance

Laboratory Animal Technologist (LATG)

- LAT certification and one year of additional experience in an approved facility, defined as a facility with either a USDA registration, AAALAC accreditation or PHS assurance number; or
- Graduate of a two-year program (AA,AAS,AS) in Veterinary Technology from an accredited program and two-years of additional animal care related experience in an approved facility, defined as a facility with either a USDA registration, AAALAC accreditation or PHS assurance number; or
- Graduate of a four-year BA/BS program in Veterinary Technology from an AVMA accredited program and three years additional experience in an approved facility, defined as a facility with either a USDA registration, AAALAC accreditation or PHS assurance number; or
- Licensed DVM: or
- High school diploma or GED and upon completion of three years of animal care experience in an approved facility, defined as a facility with either a USDA registration, AAALAC accreditation or PHS assurance

How does the Professional Examination Service verify my employment?

The applicant must provide proof of the dates and duties involved for each employer listed. In addition, approximately 10% of the applications will be carefully screened by AALAS to verify the applicant's employment information. Applicants who misrepresent their credentials may be permanently barred from the certification program.

How much does it cost to take the certification exam?

Fees for 1994 will be as follows:

The current refund policy allows for all but \$25 to be returned to unqualified applicants.

Please note: Copies of membership cards must be sent with the application form, and membership fees may no longer be sent with the application. Therefore, to qualify for the member rate, you must obtain your AALAS membership and receive your membership card before sending your application form.
